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1. Vision Statement

The South Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership (SWCSP) vision for South Warwickshire is that it should be an attractive and desirable place to live, work and visit, with a sense of safety which reflects the low risk of becoming a victim of crime in the area.

2. Introduction

The production of a Partnership Plan is a statutory duty and follows agreement of the 2014/15 priorities and can only be produced following agreement of the County Community Safety Agreement (see 12.1)

It is a public document.

The Partnership Plan details performance against the 2013/14 targets, confirms priorities and targets for 2014/15 and sets out how we will utilise resources to achieve maximum impact during the forthcoming year. It will be revised on an annual basis until it is completely re-drafted in 2017.

This Plan has been revised following approval of the 2014/15 Partnership Strategic Assessment and takes into account a number of existing strategies and plans which complement this Partnership Plan and contribute to its aims and objectives including:

- Warwickshire Community Safety Agreement
- Warwickshire Alcohol and Drugs Implementation Plan
- Warwickshire Violence against Women & Girls Strategy
- Warwickshire Strategy for Reducing Reoffending.
- Warwickshire ASB Strategy
- South Warwickshire Violent Crime Action Plan
- South Warwickshire Antisocial Behaviour Approach & Action Plan
- Warwickshire Police & Crime Plan
- Youth Justice Plan
- Warwickshire Prevent Strategy

4. Context -Horizon Scanning

The aim of the Strategic Assessment is to provide an accurate picture of the crime and disorder issues affecting South Warwickshire and to inform the review of the existing Partnership priorities. The report identifies long and short term trends and issues affecting SWCSP. It also aims to predict any increase/decrease in crimes/incidents and identify new and emerging threats.

When the Strategic Assessment was produced in January 2014, Warwickshire Observatory identified some broad political, economic, social and organisational issues which might impact on SWCSP. These are detailed in appendix 12.2.

5. SWCSP Priorities and Targets 2014/15

At a Special Meeting of the Strategic Member Board held on Monday 27th January 2014, it was resolved that the SWCSP Priorities for 2014/15 would be:

Violent Crime

v To maintain violent crime as a priority.

v Focusing on alcohol/drug related violence, concentrating efforts on town centre violence in both Leamington and Stratford.

- Focusing on offender management and early intervention in relation to young people, with the 16 to 25 year old age group being the key offending group in both districts.
- v Focusing on domestic violence across both Stratford and Warwick Districts.

Anti-Social Behaviour

- To maintain anti-social behaviour as a priority with a focus on alcohol related anti-social behaviour. It is also recommended to target anti-social behaviour occurring in the town centres.
- To support the early intervention of ASB victims through a coordinated partnership approach towards ASB.

- v To undertake ASBIT patrols in local hot spot areas to reduce the occurrence of small deliberate fires.
- To support use of Community Speed Watch to reduce the harm and fear arising from inappropriate traffic speed on local roads.

Re-Offending

- ^v It is proposed that 'reducing re-offending' is monitored as a priority for South Warwickshire CSP.
- To focus on preventing and reducing re-offending and prioritising the offenders of violent crime and vehicle crime.
- ^v It is recommended that South Warwickshire CSP continue to focus on and support and closely monitor offender management, especially with the changes to the Probation Service, both nationally and locally.

Alcohol and Drugs

To maintain alcohol as a key theme within the priorities of violent crime, anti-social behaviour.

Emerging Issues

v Theft from vehicle offences.

6. Funding 2014/15

SWCSP has no independent resources and relies instead on the core funding of partner agencies and now the outcome of a bidding process to the Police & Crime Commissioner (PCC).

In 2013/14 the PCC found additional money to maintain previous award levels to the four county CSP's with SWCSP receiving £37,904. The first bid was for `Going Out & Staying Safe' a development of our early intervention approach designed to reduce violent crime and rowdy anti-social behaviour. A second bid was made to the PCC's Innovative Community Safety Initiatives Fund for an advertising campaign designed to get people to take responsibility. A further award of £15,000 was made.

In 2014/15 the CSP's and voluntary agencies were able to bid to a much larger fund made available to the PCC. SWCSP made four successful bids. Three of these bids were to the Community Safety Fund:

• Going Out & Staying Safe (GOSS)- £69,439

Outcomes are to reduce violence and reduce anti-social behaviour and reduce re-offending. GOSS is the early intervention approach developed to reduce late night violence and rowdy behaviour in the two hot-spots in South Warwickshire being Learnington and Stratford Town Centres. This model is intelligence led in terms of times, locations and offenders and has proved to be very effective. It is aimed at the 16-25 age group who are the most likely perpetrators and victims of violence and most likely perpetrators of rowdy behaviour.

- Deliberate small fires £4,050
 Outcomes are to reduce small deliberate fires and anti-social behaviour. We will re-introduce anti-social behaviour intervention teams (ASBiT) which are joint Fire & Rescue and PCSO patrols in the hot spot areas during the evening.
- Geared Up/First Gear £8,000
 Outcomes are to reduce re-offending.
 Geared Up & First Gear are courses designed for young people in trouble or on the edge of getting into trouble who may have an interest in motor cars or motor cycles and want to learn the rudiments of mechanical engineering.

One of the PCC's priorities is to reduce crime in the rural areas. A further bid was made available to this Fund.

• Reducing Crime in the Rural Area -£49,208

Outcome – to reduce rural crime. Utilising Police crime data and the Council's survey data, details of crimes, their impact and residents' concerns will be used to provide targeted responses in rural areas.

7. Supporting work coordinated at a county level

The Partnership also supports the following areas where work is co-ordinated countywide to address both local and national concerns.

- Domestic Abuse.
- Counter Terrorism principally the Prevent Strand, but including work on Hate Crime & Community Engagement.
- Integrated Offender Management including Priority & Prolific Offenders
- Tackling alcohol abuse as a cause of crime and disorder

8. Countywide Community Safety Agreement & Priorities

In two tier areas such as Warwickshire, there is a requirement to produce a community safety agreement each year. This agreement should:

- Identify ways of co-ordinating across the county to address priorities
- Identify how responsible authorities might otherwise contribute to reducing crime, disorder and substance misuse through closer joint working across the county. (see appendix 12.1)

9. Reducing Violent Crime

Lead Agency: Warwickshire Police

Lead Officer: Superintendent Debra Tedds

Performance Indicators:

- Number of violent crimes
- Number of domestic violent crimes
- Number of alcohol related crimes

Measurement:

• Police and Observatory performance data

Target:

• A reduction in number of violent crimes

Definition: The Home Office definition of violent crime includes robbery, sexual offences, and a group of Violence Against the Person offences ranging from assault without injury, through wounding, to homicide. Similarly, the British Crime Survey definition of violent crime contains a wide range of offences, from minor assaults such as pushing and shoving that result in no physical harm through to serious incidents of wounding and murder. Categorisation is largely a matter of professional judgement and may be based on perception of intent as well as the outcome of the assault.

Main Points from the 2014/15 Strategic Assessment

- In the period November 2012 to October 2013 there were 35 fewer violent crimes compared to the previous 12 month period. A reduction of 2%.
- 63% of violent crimes occurred in Warwick District and 37% in Stratford District
- 36% of all violent crimes have an alcohol/drugs element
- Learnington & Stratford Town Centres are the top two Super Output Areas (SOA's)
- 32% of all victims are in the 16-25 age group
- 22% of all offenders are aged 19-22
- 5% of violent offenders had 2 or more offences in the 12 month period
- The number of domestic violence offences increased from 535 to 554.
- The proportion of offences that were domestic increased from 23% to 25%.
- The top 3 wards for DV are all in Warwick District
- Alcohol or drugs featured in 38% of DV cases
- 60% of all DV cases were serious violence

Domestic Abuse: SWCSP is fully committed to the countywide approach which encourages victims of domestic abuse to come forward and seek help. The Partnership has contributed to a countywide Violence Against Women & Girls Domestic Abuse Strategy which includes key messages for perpetrators, victims and witnesses, including language and terminology; the place of alcohol in domestic abuse (previous analysis has shown that violent crime is linked to key sporting events); the effects of family and the wider community; appropriate media to communicate the campaign, e.g. website, phone line, e-mail. The lead agency in tackling DA is Warwickshire County Council.

Encouraging victims to report incidents of domestic abuse will inevitably increase the overall incidence of recorded violent crime.

Focus – `**Going Out & Staying Safe` – Tackling Violence in the Night time Economy (Leamington & Stratford Town Centres)** In 2014/15 SWCSP will further develop its early intervention approach to reducing late night violence and rowdy behaviour in the two hot-spots in South Warwickshire being Leamington and Stratford Town Centres. This model is intelligence led in terms of our known busiest nights re events and public holidays but also trends re peaks in violent crime over a 3 year period. It is aimed at the 16-25 age group who are the most likely perpetrators and victims of violence and most likely perpetrators of rowdy behaviour.

Operation `Your Town, Your Choice' initiatives will be used prior to peak periods in both Learnington & Stratford Town Centres in order to engage with the key target group.

There are 3 elements being Early Intervention; Licensing Enforcement, and Engaging with the Target Group.

Early Intervention -Led by the Partnership Police Sergeant we will staff the busiest nights, not just pay-day weekends and public holidays but for example the first big student night in Learnington. Additional Police Officers and Street Marshals will provide a high visibility, presence supported by an additional CCTV operative during the busiest hours. Street Pastors will provide calming and reassuring presence and support vulnerable people. Tools used to ensure that problems do not escalate include confiscation of alcohol under Designated Public Places Orders, S27 Direct to Leave and Power of Dispersal.

Licensing Enforcement - We need more people to take responsibility for the safety of our town centre users. We will work more closely and effectively with our licensees including regular proactive meetings with our busiest premises. We will ensure that violent offenders are banned from Pubwatch & Bardwatch premises. In order to ensure that we are reducing reoffending we will offer the Alcohol Diversion Scheme to those in custody. Licensing Enforcement will be led by district council licensing multi agency teams made up of Police, Trading Standards, Environmental Health & Fire & Rescue Officers. We will visit licensed premises to ensure that the licensing conditions are being complied with.

Engaging with the target group - we will reach more of the 16-25 age group developing our `Your Town, Your Choice' events as follows:

- Greater and improved use of Social Media more trending, more tweeting and re-tweets. We will utilise a large inflatable screen to attract the target group and get across key messages
- Target Students following the successful event on September 30th, 2013 we will work with the Students Union at The University of Warwick to organise an event located on Spencer St aimed at the first big student night in Learnington.

Delivery Plans: SWCSP has a 51 point action plan (see appendix 12.3) and 15 of these are high impact. We use a trafficlight monitoring system and currently 12 are green, and 3 are amber. None are red. Action plans are monitored at quarterly meetings of the South Warwickshire Operational Group.

Building on actions already in place, we will be evidence driven using sharper analysis, better profiling and better information, the delivery plans will adopt a high-harm approach, identifying those individuals, locations and time periods which give rise to the greatest number of reported incidents.

We already know a lot about what works - high visibility multi agency operations piloted in specific micro-beats within Learnington and Stratford town centres as part of `Your Town Your Choice' (YTYC) have impacted positively on violent crime - and new initiatives are being piloted that could emerge as best practice.

10. Anti-Social Behaviour

Lead Agencies: Stratford-on-Avon District Council & Warwick District Council

Lead Officers – Karin Stanley & Pete Cutts

Performance Indicators:

- numbers of ASB incidents
- risk reductions for High Risk victims
- numbers of criminal damage
- numbers of deliberate small fires

Measurement:

• Police and Observatory performance data

Target:

• Reduction in ASB incidents

Definition: the definition of anti-social behaviour in Section 1 of the Crime and Disorder Act (1998) is 'behaviour which causes or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to one or more people who are not in the same household as the perpetrator'. * The SWCSP interpretation encompasses a broader range, is not dependent on the tolerance and perception of the person affected, and includes behaviour which adversely affects the quality of life of communities. SWCSP have agreed that this Partnership Plan should also include criminal damage within the definition, as it impacts on communities and the environment and strategies to reduce ASB and Serious Violence are likely to impact positively on reducing criminal damage.

*The definition of anti-social behaviour changes n the autumn of 2014 to `nuisance and annoyance`

Main Points from the 2013/14 Strategic Assessment

- In the period November 2012 to October 2013 there were 7,977 ASB incidents in South Warwickshire a reduction of 188 or 2%.
- 62% of ASB incidents took place in Warwick District with 38% in Stratford District
- 71.5% of incidents were classified as nuisance, 23.5% personal and 5% environmental
- Learnington & Stratford Town Centres are the SOA's with the highest number of ASB incidents
- Tackling ASB is the number one community forum priority
- The level of criminal damage fell by 9%
- The level of small deliberate fires increased by 22 (31%)

Focus: Rowdy Behaviour & Victim Centred Approach

SWCSP will build on the early intervention approach (outlined in the Violence Action Plan) it has developed in partnership with the Police and other agencies over the last three years, with the objective of modifying individual behaviour at first contact. Through this approach, the SWCSP also aims to reduce the impact of alcohol in incidents of ASB, criminal damage and violent crime.

The early intervention approach will impact on the volume rowdy nuisance behaviour in the town centres. There will also be action plans in other hot-spot areas usually to address youth related ASB in our open spaces.

This approach is in line with current government thinking for reducing ASB and was rooted in the national Respect agenda with, links to the Warwickshire ASB Strategy.

In parallel with the early intervention approach to perpetrators is the risk assessment of victims and witnesses to ensure that the most vulnerable get the support they need.

A victim-centred approach is now in place with all personal ASB victims now risk-assessed. A common risk matrix is used and in order to manage the risk of the most vulnerable there are clear owners (lead agency) and an action plan for each case. All high risk cases are re-assessed. The workload is such that an additional case management meeting is now in place.

A three-strand approach adopted as the South Warwickshire Anti-Social Behaviour Strategy, incorporating prevention/diversion, education, and enforcement is in place. It centres on people taking responsibility for their actions as individuals and neighbours whilst at the same time trying to increase understanding and tolerance between those with possibly opposing viewpoints.

Sharing information is key to managing the risk and the E-CINS web-based system will be on-line in South Warwickshire in the summer of 2014.

Deliberate small fires

This is one of only two crime types in South Warwickshire that increased in 2013/14 compared to the previous year.

Outcomes are to reduce small deliberate fires and anti-social behaviour.

Most small deliberate fires are carried out within 300m of the perpetrators home and the perpetrators are usually mid to late teens. These individuals are often the same individuals we are dealing with for other anti-social behaviour.

Analysis following the Strategic Assessment shows a long and hot summer with peaks in April (14 arson incidents) July (19 arson incidents), and August (9 arson incidents). Areas within the Warwick Safer Neighbourhood Areas (SNA) and Bidford SNA's were the hot spots.

We will re-introduce anti-social behaviour intervention teams (ASBiT) which are joint Fire & Rescue and Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) patrols in the hot-spot areas during the evening and covering the hours between 20.00 and 22.00 when 20% of incidents occur.

Delivery Plans

SWCSP has a 30 point action plan (see appendix 12.4). Currently 5 are green, 18 are amber and 7 are red. The number of reds reflects the imminent changes to ASB legislation. Actions are monitored at quarterly meetings of the South Warwickshire Operational Group.

Taking Responsibility and Going Out & Staying Safe (GOSS) are key messages in the plans and resources are targeted at specific groups including householders in terms of being good neighbours, parents, young people and the 16 -25 age group.

When a particular hot-spot is identified then additional resources can be directed to that area utilising an appropriate mix of the 3 elements.

11. Monitoring and Review

As outlined in its Terms of Reference, SWCSP is made up from a number of Responsible Authorities which meet at Operational and Strategic levels. The SWCSP Board is the Strategic level group and meets in order to carry out the statutory duties as follows:

- May receive end of year performance and agree targets
- November receive six monthly performance and review priorities
- January –a special meeting to receive and sign off the annual picture of crime and disorder and agree priorities.

The South Warwickshire Operational Group meets quarterly (February, May, August & November) to monitor the actions plans for tackling violence and anti-social behaviour.

It is essential that SWCSP maintains its ability to respond to changing influences on its business. While it has clearly identified what its core business is, the partnership will review, as part of its regular monitoring; other emerging local and national issues and seeks to respond to them appropriately.

Although this Partnership Plan is current for the period April 2014-March 2015, it is, as required by legislation, subject to an annual Strategic Assessment and Review.

12.2 Horizon Scanning

Political/Economical

Warwickshire Police – West Mercia Strategic Alliance

From September 2013, policing across Warwickshire will be delivered jointly through an alliance with West Mercia Police. By 2015, the alliance will help Warwickshire Police meet the £10.1 million funding shortfall arising from the Government's Comprehensive Spending Review. The alliance is hoped to provide Warwickshire Police with a greater opportunity to protect front line policing resources by doing things once, sharing assets and ensuring that processes are lean and effective.

The new policing areas across both forces are: Herefordshire; North Warwickshire; North Worcestershire; Shropshire; South Warwickshire; South Worcestershire; Telford & Wrekin. Across Warwickshire there will be three patrol bases and 33 safer neighbourhood teams. Each safer neighbourhood team will have a named local police officer supported by a police community support officers (PCSOs), Specials and volunteers. A senior police officer of superintendent rank will lead policing in each area, deploying locally-based resources to address local policing issues.

Changes to the Probation Service

The Ministry of Justice's "Transforming Rehabilitation: A Strategy for Reform" sets out the Government's plans for transforming the way in which offenders are managed in the community in order to bring down re-offending rates. The new public body, likely to be called The National Probation Service, will be responsible for all violent and sex offenders who are sentenced to more than a year in custody. They will also be responsible for high risk of harm sexual and violent offenders sentenced in the community and all 'public interest' decision making (i.e. court work, court and parole reports, agreeing breach and recall decisions). Roughly speaking the new providers will be responsible for approximately 70-80% of the cases of the current probation service and approximately 60% of its existing staff and resources. Other key aspects of the reform include:

- Every offender released from custody will receive statutory supervision and rehabilitation in the community.
- A nationwide 'through the prison gate' resettlement service will be put in place, meaning most offenders are given continuous support by one provider from custody into the community.
- The market will be opened up to a diverse range of new rehabilitation providers.
- New payment incentives for market providers to 'focus relentlessly on reforming offenders' will be introduced, 'giving
 providers flexibility to do what works and freedom from bureaucracy, but only paying them in full for real reductions in
 reoffending' (Payment by Results PbR).

It is not yet known the full impact of these planned changes locally in Warwickshire but the changes have a direct impact on Probation Service colleagues and there is likely to be a significant impact on the work of other board partners; on the levels of crime in the county and the effect of any increased crime on the Warwickshire community.

Welfare Benefit Cuts

In July 2013, most local authorities in England have introduced a benefits cap which will affect Job Seekers' Allowance claimants. The benefit cap sets a limit on welfare payments, limiting the total amount of benefits received to a maximum amount of \pounds 500 per week for single parents and couples with children and \pounds 350 per week for single households. However, it is likely that the cap will have an impact on JSA claimants in the county and moreover, as Universal Credit comes into effect from October 2013, there will be a transition period up to 2017 where those who are unemployed may be claiming JSA or Universal Credit.

Furthermore, the welfare benefit will in turn affect those claiming benefits who also lead criminal lifestyles. Currently anyone who is claiming for benefits who are convicted of a crime is made to pay £5 a week maximum. Under the new plans, this will rise to £25 in a battle to deter criminals claiming benefits from offending. This could however have the reverse effect and result in increased offending as a result of opposition and rebellion against the new change.

Long-Term Unemployment

In the last year, significant reductions have been seen in the overall numbers claiming Job Seekers Allowance benefits in Warwickshire. However, over the same period, those who have been unemployed for over twelve months has risen. Generally speaking, those who have been out of work for longer periods of time will find it more difficult to get a job, as well as having a negative impact on their health and well-being. This means that as the job market improves, the long-term unemployed will find it harder to compete with other jobseekers.

In June 2011, the UK Government introduced the Work Programme in an attempt to help provide personalised support for the long-term unemployed. It would seem that the programme has had limited success so far as the numbers of people who are considered to be long term unemployed continues to increase year-on-year across the county.

Community Safety Ambassadors

As part of his engagement strategy the Warwickshire Police Crime Commissioner is currently in the process of recruiting 30 Community Safety Ambassadors. The Ambassadors will act as the 'eyes and ears' of the Commissioner and will ensure he is kept informed of local issues, concerns and developments. They will be required to attend and report upon their local community forum, keep in touch with other local groups and inform the Commissioner's office of issues of relevance for him. They will also have a relationship with their local Safer Neighbourhood Team and ensure the Commissioner is briefed about concerns and successes. It is hoped that this will strengthen the link between the community, Police and District/Borough Councils.

Health

On 1 April 2013, responsibility for public health 'came home' to local government. This presents an important renewed leadership challenge for local authorities. At a time when local government is under severe financial pressure and is re-thinking its approach to delivering public services, council leaders and chief officers need to be sure that the way they carry out their public health role delivers the best outcomes for their communities and makes the most effective use of resources.

Social

Ageing Population

Warwickshire has an ageing population and currently, two out of every three deaths in Warwickshire do not occur until people are at least 75 years old, and it is likely that incidents of conditions such as mental health illness and cancer are likely to increase as residents start to live longer. This will impact on both the health service and also community safety resources as very often the most vulnerable people become victims of crime and elderly people can be an easy target for offenders.

Social Networking

Social networking is a revolution in technology but it can provide avenues for crime, for example identity fraud, hate crime, rioting and bullying. On a positive note however, social networking is being used by Warwickshire Community Safety and Warwickshire Police to engage with local communities (through the use of Facebook and Twitter). It can help to advise neighbourhood watch messages and also inform local people of problems or incidents occurring in their local area and what they can do to prevent things happening to them. It is believed this approach may help to engage younger people but the initiatives are still relatively new and are still building up contacts within the local community.

Legal Highs

In 2011, EU researchers found 49 new legal drugs for sale online. In 2012, 73 were identified and hundreds more were banned. They are considered illegal under current medicine legislation to sell, supply or advertise for "human consumption". To get round this sellers refer to them as research chemicals, plant food, bath crystals or pond cleaner. In many cases, 'legal highs' have been designed to mimic class A drugs, but are structurally different enough to avoid being classified as illegal substances under the Misuse of Drugs Act. There has been very little research into the short, medium and long term risks of the various 'legal highs'. However, it is becoming increasingly clear that they are far from harmless and can have similar health risks to drugs like cocaine, ecstasy and speed.

Technological

High value desirable goods e.g. I Phones, Laptops

Technology is advancing all the time and many of the items on the market are of a high value. There are also items that are very desirable and constantly in demand, for example gaming products. Both the availability and non-availability of these products in the market could mean an increase in shoplifting, theft, robbery or burglaries especially in the current economic climate when goods can be easily sold on.

Cyber Crime

On the 21st October 2013, the Home Office Affairs Committee published the Government response to the 5th report for the 2013/14 E-crime. Within the report it was highlighted that current recording practices are inadequate to give an accurate picture of the extent to which reported crime is committed over the internet. The Home Office recommended the introduction of an additional field on crime reporting forms to indicate whether or not there was digital evidence relating to a crime. This would help the Police to understand the extent of the problem they were facing and to make sure they have the appropriate resources in place.

Legal

ASB – Victim Centred Approach & ECINS (link to Priority Families)

The government is currently reviewing the way that anti-social behaviour is dealt with. Its aim is to ensure that victims are put at the centre of the response and see that any action is locally driven. In early 2010, the Home Office approached the 'Empowering Communities' enterprise (ECINS) with the idea that this enterprise could help develop a complete cloud based neighbourhood management tool that would allow victims, offenders and vulnerable persons to be managed on one system. In Warwickshire, partner agencies understand the importance of taking a multi-agency approach to tackling anti-social behaviour.

Work is underway on the victim centred approach, ECINS, and hopefully community safety partners will be able to put this into action. ECINS has been transformed into a multi-agency information sharing system, which allows partners to share information on victims and perpetrators on a single system. It has the ability to identify those at greatest risk and for referrals to be made to the appropriate agencies quickly and efficiently. This enables efficiency savings in time and resources and most importantly allows support to be directed to those who need it promptly.

ASB Strategy

Anti-Social behaviour (ASB) remains a high priority in Warwickshire, confirmed by the 2012/13 strategic assessments. All agencies remain committed to the reduction of ASB incidents and to making the most effective use of available resources. Anti-social behaviour affects the quality of life of our citizens, impacts directly upon levels of fear of crime and is linked with several crime types, including criminal damage, arson and harassment. There is an expectation for all partners involved in Community Safety Partnerships to consider anti-social behaviour when developing Partnership Plans.

The ASB strategy has the support of all members of Safer and Stronger Partnership Board. Its fundamental aim is to improve the quality of life for people across the county by tackling the causes and effects of anti-social behaviour in individuals, families and communities.

Environmental

HS2 – High Speed Rail Link

Last year a public consultation closed into the proposed national high speed rail network from London to Birmingham, with 55,000 responses received. The Transport Secretary has decided to proceed with the recommended route. The first phase of the project has now commenced, with work beginning on engineering, design and environmental work. The proposed route will have a considerable impact on Warwickshire and its residents.
