## 1. Summary

- 1.1 Warwick District Council Licensing Authority has received a valid application for a premises licence for Casa Rica, 1 Brunswick Street, Leamington Spa, Warwickshire.
- 1.2 Representations have been received in relation to this application for the consideration of the panel in the determination of the application.

#### 2. Recommendation

- 2.1 Members are asked to consider the information contained in this report and decide whether the application for 1 Brunswick Street, Learnington Spa should be granted and, if so, whether the licence should be subject to any additional conditions.
- 2.2 When considering the application the panel must also give appropriate weight to:
  - a) The representations received.
  - b) Statutory guidance issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003.
  - c) The Council's Licensing Policy Statement (attached as appendix 7)
  - d) The Licensing Objectives, which are:
    - i) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.
    - ii) Public Safety.
    - iii) The Prevention of Public Nuisance.
    - iv) The Protection of Children from Harm.

However, it should only consider those licensing objectives which have been referred to in the representations received.

- 2.3 The Council's Licensing Policy Statement provides that the authority will take an objective view on all applications and will seek to attach appropriate and proportionate conditions to licences where necessary in order to ensure the promotion of the four licensing objectives. Each application will be judged on its own merits.
- 2.4 Details of the procedure adopted by the Licensing Committee for Panel Hearings have been supplied to the applicant and those making representations. The procedure will be explained more fully by one of the Council's Legal Team at the commencement of the hearing.

#### 3. Reasons for the Recommendation

- 3.1 Mr Mehdi Bijannejad applied for a premises licence for 1 Brunswick Street, Leamington Spa, Warwickshire on 9<sup>th</sup> August 2019.
- 3.2 The licensable hours and activity requested by the applicant are shown in the table below:

- 3.3 The Licensing Department have received a representation from Warwick District Council Environmental Health which is attached as appendix 2.
- 3.4 Representations have also been received from local residents.

The representation attached as appendix 3, is a group representation, 13 names have been redacted from the representation in line with our duties under GDPR because the licensing team did not receive direct instruction from them that their details could be made public. However, a full version of this representation will be available at the licensing panel.

#### The Prevention of Public Nuisance

Deliveries of goods to the premises will done in the daytime. Vigilance and give notice to any customers who are noisy to respect the neighbourhood.

#### The Protection of Children from Harm

Normally children will be served first and served with care so that they can be back as soon as possible and prevent and be vigilant regarding their safety.

#### Casa Rica, Brunswick Street Leamington-Application for Late Night Refreshment Licence

I write in response to your recent consultation

Environmental Health object to the hours applied for as this is likely to give rise to nuisance from noise in the early hours of the morning.

Residents close by are likely to be disturbed by operation of the kitchen, cooking and ventilation equipment at times when the area would otherwise be quiet. Take- away sales are likely to cause people to loiter around the premises who would otherwise pass by ,with noise of conversation and raised voices of customers going in and out during the small hours the street would otherwise be quiet.

For Information there is a condition attached to the Planning Consent W901381 for the hot food takeaway which prohibits opening to the public after 11.30pm and prohibits opening on Sunday to protect the amenity of surrounding properties. Were Mr Bijannejad to apply for relaxation of the Planning condition, Environmental Health would oppose such application for the reasons set out above.

Our objection is based on the following:

I am objecting to the application because of the impact that it is likely to have on residents in the immediate area. Specifically, noise and anti-social behaviour late at night and the early hours of the morning.

Every year local residents are subjected to a great deal of noise along Clements street, Brunswick street and Tatchbrook road. All neighbouring roads are also affected by late night noise. This noise is caused in the main by many young people heading home from late clubs and bars, they are often drunk and rowdy and very likely to stop at Casa Rica for refreshments and general congretation. As an example of the problem in the autumn term of 2018 I counted 100 young people moving along Charlotte street in both large and small groups in the period 12am - 1pm. In every case they were chattering, shouting and screaming as if it were Saturday lunchtime. This is very disruptive and is not an unusual occurrence south of the river. Unfortunately it is very clear that the rise in student numbers exacerbates the problem. Each September we see the population of Learnington rise considerably with the arrival of so many young people who frankly, are here to party at the expense of the settled community.

2018/19 - **6004** 

2019/20 - **6314** 

2020/21 - **6501** 

2021/22 - **6607** 

Police reports for our area state that in the period August 2018 to July 2019 Leamington South experience **785** incidents of ASB, **135** Public Order offences, **693** Violence and sexual offences.

We (see residents who are supporting this application below) believe that if CASA RICA is allowed a late night license so that they can serve on premises and apparently Monday through Thursday 11pm – 2am and Friday through Sunday 11pm to 3am. It can only be said that this is a cynical attempt to create money out of students at the expense of residents.

The applicant has provided no statement on how prevention of crime, disorder and public safety and the prevention of noise nuisance will be addressed and frankly does not address the questions raised at all indeed the comment regarding

Is this at 3am in the morning? What do they mean "served first and with care"?

Myself and other residents are also concerned that even more rubbish will be generated if this application goes ahead and this will be strewn about the area.

Please, this is a residential area and not the town centre. Please refuse this application.

I am away on holiday until 25<sup>th</sup> September and therefore unable to attend a hearing before this date.

- 1. We fully support the existing objection by Len Mackin on behalf of Solar, and Solar has agreed that we may speak on their behalf. (Email chain exists)
- 2. Additionally, we wish to make the point that Leamington south of the canal bridge is very largely residential. The few business premises that exist maintain normal shop closing hours. (Brunswick stores: 10pm; dry cleaners and funeral directors etc: 5-5.30). Casa Rica itself abuts directly onto thirteen residential flats, with addresses on Ranelagh Street. It is directly on the walking route into south Leamington from the pubs and clubs uptown.
- 3. Noise and litter nuisance is well documented in this area of Brunswick, Charlotte Street, Ranelagh Street, Clarence Street, and (crucially) the public footpath that runs from Brunswick street down to the Eagle Rec. Much of the litter already involves fast food boxes and wrappings. Noise nuisance is not confined to university terms, though it is most extreme and persistent then. It is difficult to report, as neither WDC nor the police have useful channels for reportage. I personally am frequently woken by persistent noise from passers by between midnight and two am. Len Mackin has kept a log of noise nuisance on charlotte street, and I am preparing one in relation to eagle street. I have recorded late night voice noise after midnight on specific dates in May and June.
- 4. Jill Barker has repeatedly reported revolting piles of litter on Ranelagh Terrace during her term as town Councillor for Brunswick, and afterwards. WDC Have been cooperative in clearing them up, but it is a persistent problem.
- 5. Prevention of public nuisance. Late night roistering, and often fighting and bad language is a public nuisance. The late hours suggested will only make an existing problem worse by encouraging people to linger on their way home.
- 6. Public safety is not enhanced, rather it is endangered by encouraging party goers to linger on the streets.
- 7. This encourages crime, both in terms of fights and assaults, but also in terms of individuals who readily become victims of thefts when they are not in full control of themselves late at night.
